



U.S. Political Engagement Report

Updated August 2025

As a leading climate positive investor, we believe we have a responsibility to engage meaningfully in policy issues aligned with our values. We advocate for policies fostering a stronger, more just, and sustainable U.S. economy through key partnerships, lobbying efforts and political contributions.

Our lobbying efforts, including in-person and virtual meetings, trade association initiatives, direct responses to Congressional bills and reports, and sign-on letters, are designed to educate policymakers. Most of our corporate political activity takes place through 501(c)(6), 501(c)(4), and 501(c)(3) groups (as detailed on pages 6-16).

In 2024, HASI executives participated in 72 meetings with U.S. legislators, executive branch officials and/or their staff, and state policymakers, discussing topics such as IRA implementation, trade policy, grid-enhancing technologies, transmission planning and interconnection, energy permitting, and other policies impacting energy storage, renewables, and energy efficiency market.

Through the company's Political Action Committee ("HASI PAC"), we make limited contributions to the campaigns of candidates for U.S. federal office who share our company's climate and clean energy priorities and other company values.

In the following pages, and to the best of our abilities, we have included five years of historical data on financial contributions to trade associations and social welfare organizations. Additionally, we have included data on PAC disbursements from 2020 to 2024 and detailed expenses related to federal lobbying from 2019 to 2024.

- **Promote Long-Term Clean Energy Tax Incentives:** Secure swift and sound implementation of the energy tax credits in the Inflation Reduction Act to maximize clean energy deployment and ensure market stability
- **Modernize the Electric Grid:** Support practical siting and permitting rules at federal, state and local levels for a reliable, secure, and clean electric grid. Advocate for the expansion of transmission infrastructure and other reforms in the wholesale power market. Establish rules that expand the use of Grid Enhancing Technologies (GETs) to increase capacity, address transmission constraints, and enable the development of renewables
- **Boost Sustainable Infrastructure Investment:** Facilitate private investment in climate change mitigation and resilient infrastructure projects through public sector programs, agency procurement mandates, public-private partnerships, and other policy instruments
- **Enhance Emissions Reporting:** Update public sector and corporate emissions reporting standards to move beyond megawatt-hour matching and focus on the quantified emissions impact of electricity consumption and generation

How We Engage with Trade Associations & Social Welfare Organizations

HASI supports a variety of tax-exempt organizations, including 501(c)3 charitable organizations, 501(c)4 social welfare organizations, and 501(c)6 trade associations. This includes using corporate treasury funds to pay for memberships in these groups. By law, social welfare organizations and trade associations are permitted to use a portion of membership dues for political activities.

Some, but not all, of the groups we belong to engage in political activities. In these instances, our membership aids company policy tracking and advocacy efforts covering a broad range of issues, including climate change, building and efficiency codes and standards, defense authorizations, energy & environmental regulation and legislation, infrastructure, regulatory reform, energy tax incentives, trade and transportation, labor, and legal and voting reforms.

Although we support several groups that further our public policy interests and business goals, we do not always support all the public positions of those associations or other companies that make up their membership. We review these memberships on an annual basis for alignment to our core vision, purpose, values and priorities.

In the pages that follow and to the best of our abilities, we have disclosed the past five years of our financial contributions to trade associations and social welfare organizations.

Launched in 2020, the Hannon Armstrong Climate Solutions Political Action Committee (“HASI PAC”) makes limited contributions to the campaigns of candidates for U.S. federal office and select state offices who share our company’s climate and clean energy priorities and other company values. HASI has put internal processes for political spending in place to ensure that political contributions are made in compliance with our political spending policy.

HASI PAC collects voluntary contributions from certain eligible employees and files a monthly public report of its receipts and disbursements with the Federal Election Commission.
